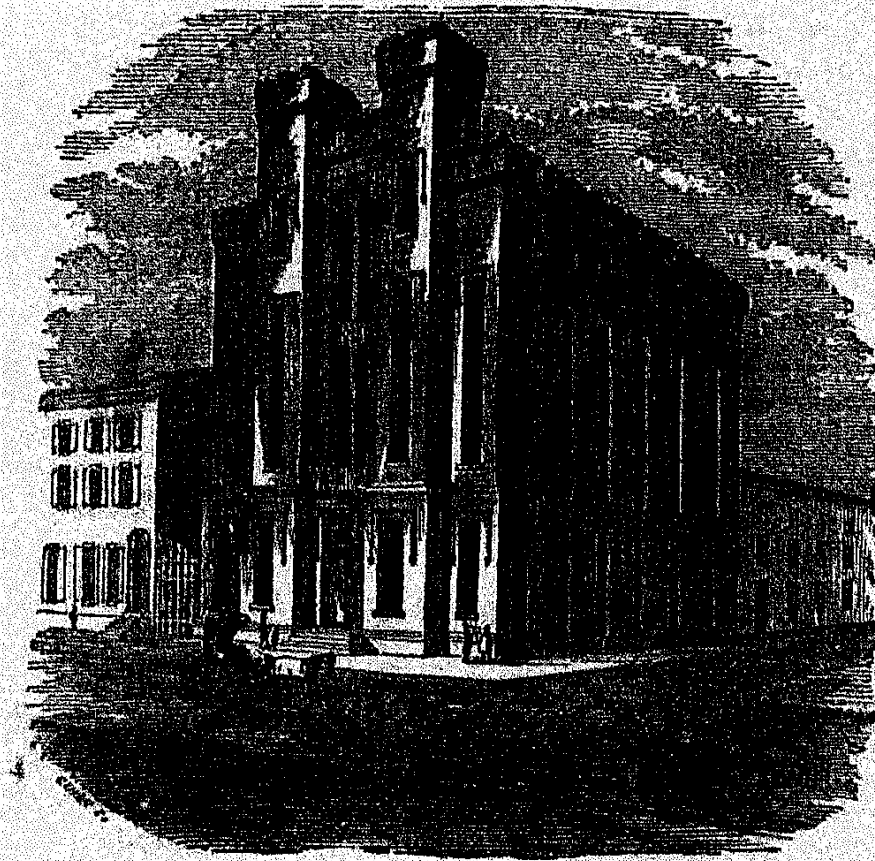

## ANNOUNCEMENT.

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The Faculty of the Medical Department of Pennsylvania College, in presenting their Annual Announcement to the Profession, embrace the occasion to offer to the Alumni, and the friends of the School, their sincere congratulations upon its continued and increasing prosperity.

It is certainly a source of satisfaction to the Faculty, to know that their endeavours to sustain an elevated standard—both of instruction and of requirements for graduation—have been appreciated by their friends in the Profession. This has been shown by the steady increase in the size of their classes for the past several years; while, at the same time, the high degree of proficiency exhibited on the part of the students, has been equally satisfactory, as evincing a due appreciation of the value of the instruction imparted.

The last graduating class exceeded in numbers any that ever received the honors of the Institution; there being an increase of *twenty four* over the graduating class of the preceding year.

Shortly before the beginning of the last session, and too late for publication in the Annual Announcement of the School, a change occurred in the Faculty, by the resignation of Professor Allen from the Chair of Anatomy, and the appointment in his place of Dr. T. G. Richardson, of Louisville, Ky. Prof. Richardson had been for several years connected with the University of Louisville, and was already favorably known to the Profession as a teacher and writer in connection with the subject of Anatomy. The experience of the past year has most satisfactorily demonstrated the wisdom of the appointment.

The Faculty are not insensible of the fact that the rapid advance in the different departments of Medical Science imposes upon them additional labors each successive year; and with the fullest appreciation of the wants of their pupils, it is their earnest and united aim to present their varied instructions in the most systematic and digested manner possible, in the comparatively limited period usually allotted to the Lectures.

Aware of the importance of enforcing, as far as practicable, the abstract truths presented to their hearers, by suitable illustrations appealing to the senses, the Faculty have been mindful to keep pace with all the improvements pertaining to their respective departments.

As regards the special means of illustration at command, it may be mentioned that the Museum is abundantly supplied. The collection of Anatomical preparations is very extensive, and has been formed by the additions of many years. The Surgical Cabinet is rich in specimens of disease and injuries of the bones, as well as in pictorial representations of surgical affections; besides which, the Professor has frequent opportunities of exhibiting recent pathological specimens to the class. The means of illustrating Microscopic Anatomy, both physiological and pathological, consist of a great variety of models and drawings, most of which have been prepared from time to time, by the Professor of Institutes, to illustrate his courses of instruction. The Obstetrical Department has received large additions to its means of illustration, in paintings, drawings, preparations, and the usual mechanical apparatus appropriate to the course of Lectures.

The Professor of the Theory and Practice, in addition to other means, possesses a complete set of paintings, representing on a large scale the pathological anatomy of disease, as well as diagrams intended to illustrate the relations, both normal and abnormal, of internal organs. He has also a large collection of pathological models; and, whenever it is practicable, exhibits

and lectures upon recent specimens of diseased structure. The Cabinet of *Materia Medica* contains a complete set of specimens of drugs selected by the Professor, and an herbarium of the entire indigenous, and a considerable portion of the foreign medicinal Flora. He is also enabled to exhibit a large number of medicinal plants in the growing state, as well as a beautifully executed series of their painted figures. The Laboratory is conveniently arranged, and well supplied with apparatus. Medical Chemistry being regarded by the Faculty as an important feature in a sound medical education, especial attention is given to this branch. Organic Chemistry, as applied to Physiology and Pathology, receives a full share of notice from the Professor of Chemistry.

The systematic examination of the students by the several Professors, which has always been the policy of the Institution, will be steadily pursued. The Faculty must renew the expression of their confidence in its great value as a means of impressing more strongly upon the mind the statements made in the Lectures, and of correcting misapprehensions which are almost inevitable. They conceive that this additional tax upon the student's time is fully compensated by a more accurate knowledge of the subject. The practice, besides inducing upon the part of the class a closer attention, has moreover the advantage of presenting the subject in a new aspect, and of adjusting it to the capacities of each individual student.

In addition to the appliances, already mentioned, for giving a complete course of medical instruction, the Faculty feel that they enjoy peculiar advantages in the location and arrangement of the College Building. They are in occupancy of a large and commodious edifice, which was erected expressly for the Medical Department of Pennsylvania College. Its locality is central, and its accommodations are ample. It contains three lecture rooms, which, in the arrangement of the seats, the means

of ventilation, and the supply of light and heat, are especially adapted to the comfort, convenience and health of the class. Their situation in the building precludes any annoyance from the noises of the street. The position of the lecturer and the elevation of the seats, allow everything said to be distinctly heard, and the various means employed for demonstration and illustration to be clearly seen and appreciated by every one in the room.

CLINICAL INSTRUCTION occupies a very prominent place in the course of study pursued in this School. Convinced, as they are, of the importance of combining sound theoretical and practical instruction, it has ever been the aim of the Faculty not merely to impart a didactic knowledge of disease, but likewise to make their pupils acquainted with it by direct personal observation. To this end, they have endeavored to place their Institution, as much as possible, upon an Hospital basis. Hospital instruction, being an essential part of the Course, is not left to the option of the Student. It is made obligatory upon him; and the most ample opportunities are afforded to all—*both first-course and second-course students*—to enjoy *gratuitously* a continued and systematic attendance at the Pennsylvania Hospital. Although this arrangement imposes some pecuniary sacrifice upon the Faculty, they cheerfully incur it from the conviction of the positive benefit which thereby accrues to their pupils.

The arrangements for Hospital Instruction are not designed to supersede the College Clinic, which will be conducted, as heretofore, by the different members of the Faculty, on every Wednesday and Saturday, throughout the Session.

To the advanced student who desires to extend his researches beyond the text-books of the course, the Library of the Pennsylvania Hospital offers unrivalled advantages. It contains the



largest and most valuable collection of medical works in the United States, and is accessible to every holder of the Hospital ticket.

The regular Course of Lectures for the Session 1857—8, will commence in the College Building, Ninth street, below Locust, on Monday, October 12th, and will continue without intermission until the 1st of March ensuing. Preliminary lectures will be delivered daily, beginning on Monday, Sept. 28th. In these it is usual to treat of subjects which, for want of time, are omitted in the subsequent courses, but which the Faculty are desirous of teaching to as many students as may see fit to attend. They cannot too strongly advise all who desire to improve the time of their pupilage to the utmost, to avail themselves of this opportunity of increasing their knowledge, as well as of becoming settled in habits of study before the opening of the regular course.

The Faculty do not permit themselves to doubt, that the advantages possessed by the Medical Department of Pennsylvania College will continue to secure for it the good will and co-operation of the Alumni of the School and of the Medical Profession generally. They know that their views are elevated—that they aspire to take a step forward in improving Medical education, and to send out from their Institution accomplished and earnest physicians, who shall do honor to it and adorn the profession. They feel that no amount of self-denial or of labor will purchase too dearly so valuable an end—one which they have sincerely at heart, and which they beg leave to commend again to the friends of the School in every part of the United States.

**OBSTETRICS AND DISEASES OF WOMEN AND CHILDREN.**—Rigby's, Lee's, Churchill's or Ramsbotham's Midwifery; Ashwell on the Diseases of Females; Condie or West on the Diseases of Children.

**MEDICAL CHEMISTRY.**—Graham's Elements of Chemistry; Fownes' Elementary Chemistry; Regnault's Chemistry; Taylor on Poisons; Bowman's Medical Chemistry; Bird on Urinary Deposits.

**INSTITUTES OF MEDICINE.**—Carpenter's Principles of Human Physiology, (edited by Prof. Smith;) Reese's or Kirke's Physiology; Williams' Principles of Medicine, and Taylor's or Wharton and Stillé's Medical Jurisprudence.

**THERAPEUTICS AND MATERIA MEDICA.**—Biddle's Review of Materia Medica; Pereira's Materia Medica; U. S. Dispensatory.

**ANATOMY.**—Richardson's, Morton's, Wilson's or Cruveilhier's Anatomy; Neill's Plates.

## REQUISITES FOR GRADUATION, &c.

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The following are the rules in relation to the degree of Doctor of Medicine.

I. The candidate must have attained the age of twenty-one years, must be of good moral character, and have applied himself to the study of medicine for three years, (courses of lectures included,) and have been, during that time, the pupil, for at least two years, of a respectable practitioner of medicine.

II. He must have attended two complete courses of lectures on all the branches, one of which must have been in this Institution.

III. He must also have attended at least one course of Clinical Instruction in some Institution approved by the Faculty, and one course of Practical Anatomy.

IV. When a candidate applies to the Registrar for admission to examination, he must produce a Thesis composed by himself on some medical subject, in the English, Latin, German, or French language. This Thesis must be in the candidate's own handwriting, and written correctly, uniformly and distinctly. The Faculty regarding this Essay as evidence of the preliminary education of the candidate, will rigidly scrutinize it in regard to his attainments.

V. The candidate shall pay the fee of graduation at or before the time of his examination, and if unsuccessful, the fee will be returned to him by the Registrar; but his Thesis will be retained.

VI. The degree will not be conferred upon any candidate who absents himself from the public commencement without the permission of the Faculty.

## PRACTICAL ANATOMY.

The department of Practical Anatomy is under the immediate charge of the Professor of Anatomy and his Assistants. The Dissecting Rooms are open during the day, and until 10 o'clock in the evening. They possess every convenience requisite for the comfort and convenience of the dissector. *Material* is abundant and supplied at a moderate price.

The rooms are open from the latter part of September to the first of May. By means of *antiseptics*, subjects are preserved in a suitable condition for dissection early in the fall and late in the spring, thus affording the student ample time and opportunity to pursue this branch of his studies.

The examination of candidates for the Degree of Doctor of Medicine will be held at the close of the Session. The Commencement for conferring Degrees will take place early in March, causing as little detention of the Graduating Class, after the close of the Lectures, as possible.

There will also be an examination of candidates for graduation, on the 1st of July; the Degree, in such cases, being conferred at the ensuing Commencement in March.

The Rooms for Practical Anatomy will be open early in September.

The Faculty, satisfied of the paramount importance of Hospital Instruction, will supply all their Students, first-course as well as second-course; gratuitously, with the Clinical Ticket of the Pennsylvania Hospital.

The College Clinic, will be conducted on every Wednesday and Saturday throughout the Session.

The Register of Matriculants will be open in the College Building, early in September. The Janitor will always be present at the College, to give every necessary assistance and information (as regards board, &c.), to students, on their arrival in the city.
